"Be the Best Neighbors"

Back during the pandemic year of 2020, I, along with several adults from the Northern Great Lakes Synod, participated in a webinar from the

ELCA on "Growing Young". It featured presenters from the Fuller Youth Institute and their research which led to a book, *Growing Young:* 6 Essential Strategies to Help Young People Discover and Love Your Church, by Kara Powell, Jake Mulder, and Brad Griffin, 2016, Baker Books.

Some people in our synod have already read this book and discussed its implications. I encourage everyone to read this book. The research of this book showed that some of our assumptions about youth ministry are probably wrong. You don't have to be a big church with a young and cool youth leader to have an effective youth ministry. You don't even have to have a lot of money to be on the right path to growing younger.

This book is the result of research from a broad range of denominations and churches of many sizes. Six key strategies emerged from the research by Fuller. One of those strategies was:

"Be the Best Neighbors: Loving and Shaping Your World Well."

Young people need to be guided by the example of adults from our churches to be good neighbors. The world is watching how our churches interact with our "neighbors." Here are some quotes from that chapter of the book about being the best neighbors:

"Christianity is about the restoration of how it is all supposed to be." *Isaiah, age 20, p. 234*

"We've always had a heart to get out of the church building and serve the world—but sometimes we also want to bring positive parts of the world into the church."

"Anyone can show up to this church on their worst day and it will turn your life around.

"No matter where churches growing young fall on the theological spectrum, they place emphasis on essential beliefs that can be shared rather than exaggerating various differences."

"Churches that want to be the best neighbors seem especially aware of their ministry to, and inclusion, of the poor."

"My friends and I need more than the cynicism we're offered by the world and wider culture. Our church offers more." A Young Adult from the Northeast, p. 253

~ Silver Creek Thrift Store is currently collecting winter outdoor wear for adults and children. Emanuel will support with a collection of gently used items (coats, boots, snowpants, hats, etc.) and take them to the Harvey store.

~Thank you letter received from the Marquette County Habitat for Humanity for the lunches Emanuel supplied for the building crew in August. Wesley Church of Ishpeming shared the results of Project Warm last winter season with serving 370 children.

~Emanuel will have a Thanksgiving worship service on Tuesday, November 21 at 2pm with a pie social to follow. Advent services will be held on Tuesdays, December 5, 12 and 19 at 2pm with fellowship to follow. Christmas Eve we will be having two services; 9am celebrating the Fourth Sunday in Advent and at 5pm we will have a traditional Christmas Eve service.

~School supplies for Lutheran World Relief school bags continue with the collection day at Messiah on October 23.

"We are looking for a storage building for the used lawn mower Emanuel purchased for the Haglund Cemetery. Building a shed may be a possibility too.
