

Welcome to the Year of our Lord 2024!

In this new year, I announce our Synod themes for the next three years,

Seed Sowers:

2024: I Planted

2025: Apollos Watered

2026: God gave the Growth

Last year at Synod Assembly, Seed Sowers was the theme for our inaugural Seed Sowers Luncheon that thanked people who had made a planned gift (meaning that they remembered NGLS/ELCA in their will) or were considering doing so. In essence, they were a Seed Sower," planting seeds for future ministry, seeds that they knew they would not see grow and bear fruit.

I think of the faithfulness of St. James in Marinette, Wi. Founded in 1918, this community of faith has been hard at work for the sake of Christ for 106 years This past autumn, the people of St. James discerned that their last worship service will be Sunday April 14, 2024.
