FLC Family,

During the season of Lent this year, we are focusing on Lament during our midweek worship services. With Ash Wednesday and our first themed service already under our belts, we have discovered that Lament is uncomfortable. Naming life's difficult, sad, frustrating, and/or devastating parts out loud is tricky because it feels like whining. It's as if we are ungrateful for the gifts God has given us.

Ultimately, complaining does not seem like it is faithful. Yet God asks for our communication. God wants to have a relationship with God's people. Real, meaningful relationships are more than skipping to the good parts. Relationships are hanging in there for all the parts. Jesus came and walked among us. He wept. He lamented that the cup be taken from him. He called his friends names. Peter, one of his closest friends, the rock for whom the church was built, was called a snake and Satan.

Jesus is in it with us for the long haul, "neither death, nor life, nor

angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord (Romans 8:38-39)." Our woes aren't specified on this list, but do



not separate us away from God. They help us explore our faith in God. We learn and grow surrounded by God's love on good and bad days.

As we think about the disciplines of Lent: praying, fasting, and giving alms, Lament is woven into that process. If you gave up sweets this year, you know how it feels. Lament is the day the Girl Scout cookies are delivered. Waiting is hard and frustrating, and eating healthy is less fun than being bad, regardless of what the health experts tell you! Yet the fast and the frustrations are meant to fuel something more.

Instead of walking past the Thin Mints with decreasing willpower and increasing resentment, turn to the other parts of the practice to refocus your energy. Prayerfully consider how you can give locally and globally. Our ABC Mission to give a book to every kid at Cameron may help the scout who sold you the cookies in the first place! Can you imagine praying every time you walked through the kitchen instead of impulsively opening the refrigerator?

Retraining our brains can be an exhausting endeavor, but we are capable. Someday, the cookie might not be such a great temptation, and a Lament to God may feel natural and normal on another day. It may reveal through discomfort a faithful connection we didn't perceive before.

Each week we will consider what it means to sit with our grief rather than try to push it aside. This series understands lament as one of the more faithful things we can do. When we approach God with honesty and humility, and we admit that some things are too big for our hearts to bear, we will find there not a disapproving God but one who weeps with us. We will find a God who can take our grief and disappointment and transform them into holy joy and renewed hope. We will learn, ultimately, that Jesus' death on the cross – the place to which the season of Lent leads us – is the reason we never mourn as those without hope.



Property Committee

The property met in February and decided to continue exploring installation of solar panels. The electronic control panel, to control lighting in the sanctuary, is functional. Rock Electric is still tweaking a few things. The wall around the men's urinal needs refurbishing; this remains in progress. There are unpainted areas around the skylight in the sewing room; work in progress. The rusty air conditioner mounts will be addressed in the spring. They have been talking with Rock Electric on a quote for new LED bulbs in the high ceiling of the

sanctuary. The committee purchased a DR edge trimmer. And, they discussed the roof scupper on the North side of the church which needs better draining, evaluated the need for a more comfortable backrest on the bench seating in the narthex and decided to schedule a free DTE Business Energy Assessment for the church. The next meeting is scheduled for *Sunday, March 3rd at 9:00 am* in the double classroom.

LIFE LINE HEALTH SCREENINGS

Life Line Screening, the nation's leading provider of preventive health screenings, will offer affordable, non-invasive and painless health screenings at First Lutheran Church on *Saturday, March 16, 2024*.

A package of four screenings to identify risk for stroke, heart disease and other chronic conditions will be offered:

Carotid Artery Screening (Plaque)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plaque. This buildup, called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.

Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening

An Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.1

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a serious medical emergency.

Atrial Fibrillation

 A 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation.
 AFib can lead to blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.2
