They all talked at once, vying for the floor, "Listen to this" I heard. And they edited each others work, and they made suggestions, and they supported each other, and they let each other know when they'd had enough feedback and constructive criticism. They discussed how many sentences a paragraph should have and commas, delighting an English teacher somewhere, but mostly they talked about what they experienced and what they wanted to share with all of you and who would get to share what. I was so caught up in their enthusiasm I forgot I was in a caravan. (But we caught up).

And this shouldn't have surprised me, because as another leader pointed out our group may have been young and all of us new to mission trips (including this adult leader), and even though most of them may start out quiet, they were always fully present. They didn't miss anything; they were engaged. They worked at all their service projects, and did with smiles for everyone. They were open to all these new experiences. They listened. They worked. And asked questions and followed instructions. And shared their thoughts. And they didn't lose sight of why they'd come. They shared God's love with strangers, each other, and new friends they made on this trip. They attended to small tasks and big tasks. They came ready to serve and have seen how meaningful service can be to others and to themselves.

And although I could talk endlessly about what I witnessed this week, and even my own transformative experiences while on this trip, it is time to hear from our youth.

On this specific day it was sprinkling. So I was at this event called people loving Nashville where there is food, clothes and music for the unhomed to come and eat, have a fun time, and get clothes. Our job was to go and talk to the unhomed and to just get to know their story. I was with an adult leader in our group (her name is Patty) and some other kids from our group, and we went up to this lady and started talking to her and she was telling us about her story and her struggles and then the rain stops and a rainbow appeared and the lady gets distracted and she said "I love rainbows" and so we talk to her about rainbows for a little bit and then the topic about what a rainbow means to her came up and she said "well, what a rainbow means to me is that God is here and reminding her that he will fulfill his proficiency's and that he will keep her safe." I thought this was a really cool experience and I learned that God shows up in different things to different people and for this lady she saw God in a rainbow. This was a reminder to me that God lives in everyone.

Another place I was at was called dream streets, At dream streets it's like a day care where parents drop off their kids and then the kids are there for most of the day. Our job was to play with the kids and at first the kids were shy but eventually got comfortable being around us and once they got used to us, the kids were constantly asking "can you push me on the swing" "come play Gaga ball" "can you play a game with me". This showed me that a simple "hi what's your name" quickly turns into the kids crying at the end of the day, begging us to not leave, push them one last time on the swing, and not wanting to end hugs. The kids were also asking if we could be there actual sister and come home with them that makes me think that they don't have a lot of family at home to give them the attention that they need or want. This is how impactful a simple "hello" can be to some people.
