PASTOR'S REFLECTIONS

One of the more intriguing news stories over the past weeks has been the county clerk in Kentucky, jailed for refusing to issue marriage licenses to same gender couples. In the midst of the controversy, it's pretty evident that the changes in both society and law have been profound. What was unimaginable just a few short years ago, now is here. Same gender couples can marry legally in this country and in this state, and while politicians opposed to same gender marriages promise to do something about it, I don't see the law, or the direction of our society turning back the clock.

Of course, for some this is to be celebrated, while others see further erosion in the fabric of our society. Interestingly, the trend has been decidedly in favor of such marriages. In 1996, 27% of Americans supported such marriages; today it's around 60%.

Still, there is disagreement, in society and in the church. I have colleagues whom I deeply respect on both sides of the issue. For some, the church is to be a place of openness and welcome, even embracing same gender relationships. For others, the church needs to stand firm and not "cave in" to the pressures of our culture.

Lot's more could be said, but what about Our Savior's? What do we do about same gender marriages? It seemed to me a good time to give you an update and let you know what is happening here. For starters, understand that we are not in the position of the county clerk in Kentucky. We are not mandated to perform same gender marriages. The courts cannot order it, nor can the state. And don't buy it when someone tells you otherwise. As a church, we are protected from that.

But you also need to know that as your pastor I do not have the freedom to do as I want. Pastor Jean and I are not making the decision or setting the policy. Bishop Arends, and other bishops around the church, have reminded us that as pastors we are not "lone rangers." We are to perform weddings, in the context of the community to which we are called. That means that our work reflects the understanding we have together as a community of faith.

At the moment, this isn't much of an issue. We have not received a request for a same gender marriage. But it will come – someday. Someday, maybe weeks from now, maybe years from now, the request will come, and we will need to know what to do.

For that reason, the Congregation Council has been in periodic conversation over the past year about same gender marriages, and whether they fit with our ministry as a congregation. We have resisted the temptation to make a quick decision, opting instead to pray, to carefully share our thoughts with each other, but also to have our ears open as we move about the congregation. What sense do we get from the congregation? Far from simply taking a vote, we really want to grasp what Our Savior's understands its ministry to be. As we have carried on our dialogue, we have wondered what happens when the issue is no longer abstract, but personal, when the individual seeking marriage is "one of us," or when grandma sits in church every week. And if we decide that such marriages can take place, do we allow them, but with some restrictions? And what happens when some agree with whatever direction we take, and others do not agree? And what does such a decision say about this congregation to the community around us?

Perhaps the most affirming thing to report is that this has been a good conversation. It has been carried out with care for each other, with understanding, and with faithful reflection.

We know that when a decision is made, not all will agree. But you can be proud of your council. They have been willing to tackle a difficult issue, but to tackle it with care for each other, care for you, and care for God's call to faithful mission.

That's what it means to be the people of God!

The Congregation Council met on Monday, September 14, with President Char Buelow presiding. At this meeting the council:

• Opened with prayer

• Met with Anne Gerrietts, ELCA Consultant, to consider how we use our building, and how the building is a resource for our ministry.

• Received as new members: Michael and Michelle Turnipseed, along with Brandon, Hannah, and Bennett; Kelsey Reed; Rachel Miller, along with Bailey; Jeremy and Tiffany Janisch, along with Madeline and Ella.

• Reviewed and approved the minutes of the regular August meeting, a special Council meeting of August 16, and the special Congregational meeting from August 30. Also reviewed and accepted the August financial reports and pastors' reports.

• Received the report on asbestos in the Mill Street house. Authorized asbestos abatement at a cost of \$5,000 to the congregation.

SPECIAL CONGREGATION MEETING

A special congregational meeting was held on Sunday, August 30, following the 10 a.m. worship service. The meeting was called to act on a proposal from the Rental Management Committee and the Congregation Council to remove the structures on the Mill Street property and prepare the lot for parking use, at a cost not to exceed \$15,000. The proposal did not include paving the lot at this time. Over 50 voting members attended the meeting.

After some discussion, the congregation voted to adopt the proposal by unanimous voice vote. The work should begin in early October, and we hope that the lot will be available for parking before winter.

MISSION DISCERNMENT

At its September meeting the Congregation Council invited members of the Vision Team and Space Team to join with them in a discussion of our ministries, and how our building can be an asset in the work we are called to do. Anne Gerrietts, an ELCA Consultant, helped facilitate our discussion, and shared a number of valuable insights with us.

Ms. Gerrietts focused especially on how our building can enhance our ministries. She encouraged us to articulate and define the ministries we believe God is calling us to carry out, and then to look at how we use our building space to make that happen. She also made some observations on how our building presents itself to visitors.

Moving forward, Ms. Gerrietts suggested some "next steps," keeping the process open and transparent, with opportunities to hear lots of voices. The Vision and Space teams will work together on the next phase of this journey. Thank you for your prayers on our behalf.

Senior Spotlight! SPOTLIGHT Celebrating our Resident Theologians...

Disciples come in all shapes and sizes. We have much to learn from our "elders" as these resident theologians have insights and stories to share. Betty Whitlock graciously allowed us to share a glimpse into her story. Betty, 83 years young, is a member of the "McClintock Clan." Betty was baptized at home when she was 4 years old. She remembers when her two sisters were born at home here in West Salem in a house (that has since been torn down) next to what is now Jandt-Fredrickson Funeral Home.

Betty's advice to new disciples of Jesus ...

without faith we wouldn't survive. Without faith, Betty believes she couldn't have survived life after the loss of her husband. Betty also believes that prayer is the most important thing.

Betty's favorite Bible passage ... because

... Betty said there are so many it's hard to choose. There are the obvious, like John 3:16, but also noteworthy is Matthew 21:22 *(Whatever you ask for in prayer with faith, you will receive.)* because Betty believes in prayer. She is happy to be on the prayer chain at church. Betty is praying all of the time – for family, friends, and all those in need. Another favorite passage is Psalm 27 *(The LoRD is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The LORD is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?...)*, because it tells us you never have to be afraid, God is always with you. This meant a lot to Betty after her husband's death.

Betty's earliest memories of church ... are of Sunday School and learning the song "Jesus Loves Me." Betty remembers teaching that song to her two younger sisters. The song reminds her that God is with her every day. Betty likes seeing all of the children in Sunday School here now knowing they are learning about Jesus' love. She said she is glad when parents bring the kids to learn about God's love. Betty also remembers that in catechism (confirmation), they had to memorize everything, and growing up she was afraid of the pastor because he was so strict (even with his own children). As children growing up, Betty and her siblings were taught the importance of helping others (and not just family).

Thank you for sharing, Betty! Please keep Betty and all of our "senior" members (and "resident theologians") in your prayers.

It's been a longtime tradition for Our Savior's Lutheran Church to share its Norwegian heritage by hosting a meatball and lutefisk dinner for our families, friends, and neighbors. All members of our congregation are encouraged to volunteer their time and donations to this event, which supports several mission projects.

We have a sign-up board in the Gathering Area. You are asked to indicate on these sheets your donations and your work time. (We do <u>not</u> call everyone on our membership list; so we ask you to sign up at church or call Lynette Ender at 786-0723, or Bonny Goodenough at 769-0758, or Inger Michael at 786-1707, Chairpersons.)

You have the choice of these donations:

- 1. <u>Two dozen</u> Norwegian baking or Non-Norwegian baking for the dinner plus two dozen for the bake sale.
- 2. <u>Three pounds</u> of butter plus something for the bake sale.
- 3. Three pounds (4-12 oz. bags) of sweetened, cooked cranberries (recipe is on the bag) and something for the bake sale.
- 4. <u>Two pounds</u> of <u>decaffeinated</u> coffee and something for the bake sale.
- 5. 50# potatoes (whites, NOT reds)
- 6. Cash or check donation to cover the cost of the lutefisk and meatballs.
