Pastor's Reflections ...

A WORD

Bah, Humbug!

It was the week before the annual meeting, and all through the office, not a creature was

resting, not even the mice! The annual reports were stacked on the table with care, in hopes that eager readers would soon be there.

OK, maybe not quite. It's not Christmas, and we are not eagerly waiting for the "St Nicholas, sugar plums, and a band of reindeer." But we are all wrapped up, not in gifts, but in all the prep it takes to get ready for the meeting.

At the same time, I'm trying to figure out what to write for this newsletter. Budgets, agendas, resolutions, calendars, even summer camping at Sugar Creek. All have been a part of my day. Almost enough to elicit an emphatic "Bah, humbug!"



And then, as if that isn't enough, we've got a Lenten "round-robin" set for this year (see the article on page ??), and that means I have some sermons to ponder and to write. Ugh!

Of course, things aren't much better outside. Snow abounds, for the moment, but a thaw is on the way, and the Super Bowl beckons. Pastor Jean and I host our conference meeting here in early February (what are we going to do?), and we've signed up to assist with the bookfair at the elementary school. I need to get my mother to Minneapolis as well as do her taxes, and then ... oh ... my taxes too!

Like I said, "Bah, humbug!"

OK, so I'm not in much of a Christmas spirit, but then again, it's not Christmas anymore. But remember? Lent is coming. Oh, that's right – and that means some more sermons, and

for me some travel – to the Presbyterian Church, to Onalaska, and even to La Crescent.

Too much. Way too much. So, one more time ... "Bah, humbug!"


That is the way it feels ... and looking around, that's the way the world is these days. Full, overwhelming, taxing, wearying, confusing, stuffed, packed ... enough to make one cry out, "Bah humbug!"

But remember? Lent is coming!

No, not the sermons or the travel, or the "quickly moving on beyond the annual meeting to the next item on the agenda." Lent. Real, honest-to-goodness Lent.

Practically speaking, that means, for us, the resumption of Lenten soup suppers ... and a time for worship ... But more than that, a time to reflect on all that we are experiencing these days. The burdens, the uncertainty, the anxieties, the "I'm worn out and I don't know how much more I can take" feeling that seems to fill our world.

And more. Lent is also about me. About my weakness, my brokenness, my vulnerability, and yes, even though we don't like to admit it – my failure, my sinfulness, my "focus only on me" attitude.



Lent is about looking in the mirror and seeing who and what we are and being honest with ourselves – it's not a pretty sight! Who wants to go there? Really, do I really want to look at me? So, one more time, "Bah, humbug."

But wait. Lent is indeed about looking at me, and seeing what I don't want to see. Lent, however, is also about

seeing beyond me. Seeing something more than me. Seeing Jesus.

We enter Lent with an eye to who and what we are, but with the other eye on who and what Jesus is, and in Jesus, what God is up to. We look ahead, through the season of Lent, and there, in the distance we see a cross and then ... an empty tomb. Lent is about God at work in the midst of our brokenness, failure, sinfulness, weariness, anxiety, confusion, and all the rest of it. God at work to restore life and hope even in the midst of all that.

That changes things. Yes, I'm busy and wrapped up in a lot of stuff, but Lent offers me something new, even refreshing. It offers the opportunity to come clean, to "fess up," and to bare my soul. But to do that in confidence, that through Jesus I am renewed and restored. Like a nice shower after a hot and sweaty workout, Lent rejuvenates me. Because Lent is about my opening myself up ... and God going to work on me.

So, back to my week. Yep, lots to do this week ... and next. Stuff to complete and accomplish. But then comes Lent. And the invitation to take a deep breath, empty my garbage, and be cleansed by God's grace.



I invite you to do the same. Take a break from the hectic world around you. Find a way to let go of yourself, and let God do a bit of "early spring cleaning." Sunday worship, mid-week worship, soup

suppers. Give them a try. Or find another way, out in the world, meeting the needs of someone ... in need. Find a way to do more than just make it through. Find a way to discover the richness that comes when you are honest about yourself, and open to God's work in you.

And maybe that is what can allow us to rise above (or better yet, be lifted up above) all the turmoil and hectic-ness of an increasingly frantic and frenetic world. God at work in us ... through the Jesus of the cross and the empty tomb.

Sunday School Offering ... Water is Life

Lack of safe water is one of the biggest challenges to overcoming poverty. It's also one of the most powerful opportunities to create change. With a simple water well, as many as 500 families gain access to clean, safe water. Communities are healthier. People spend less money on medical expenses and more on food and education. And, instead of spending hours each day gathering water for the family, women and children have time for work and school. Talk about a future filled with hope! A simple water well costs \$2,500. We are doing our part to obtain a share of providing a well.

Check out the bulletin board by Pastor Jean's office, and watch as we will soon move our buckets off the board.



Friendly competition — 1st graders are in a comfortable lead with \$104, followed by the 4th graders at \$83. All together our children have brought in \$362.74 for the ELCA World Hunger Water Project. Way to go kids! You are making a difference in the lives of people!




Wishing for water



Congregation Council

The Congregation Council met on Monday, January 15, with President Jeff Haldeman presiding.

At this meeting the council:

- + Shared in devotions around John 1:1-5.
- + Approved the minutes from the December meeting, and received financials for December and the pastors' reports.
- + Heard reports on a number of congregational ministries.
- + Heard that Pastor Jon will gather with a variety of folk on January 28 to consider youth ministry. Council members were encouraged to join the conversation.
- + Authorized the Signage Task Force to move ahead with the proposed interior signs, at a cost not to exceed \$1,000.
- + Set worship time for Ash Wednesday and mid-week Lenten worship at 6:15 pm on Wednesdays.
- + Voted to recommend the quote from DBS Group for storm damage repair of church building to the Congregation annual meeting, and to defer work on the house and garage until further examination in spring.
- + Received an update on nominations for council and other positions.
- + Reviewed the budget proposal from the Administration Committee. Voted to recommend the budget to the annual meeting as presented, with a small change in the proposed salaries.
- + Received as information the Mission Endowment Fund proposal to be presented to the annual meeting.
- + Heard that Our Savior's will host a synod retreat on February 17 for congregation council members and officers from around the synod, and were encouraged to attend.

The council next meets on Monday, February 12 at 7 PM. If you have questions, or if you have ideas for enhancing the ministry of Our Savior's, contact Jeff Haldeman or one of the pastors.



Annual Meeting Review

The 2024 Annual Meeting met on Sunday, January 28, to reflect on our ministry, set goals for 2024, and celebrate God's gifts of life and

hope. We worshiped together, laughed a bit, and then went forth empowered by the Holy Spirit.

President Jeff Haldeman called the meeting to order at 11:33 am, with 42 voting members in attendance. We began with devotions and a video message from Bishop Felix Malpica of the La Crosse Area Synod.

Reports from the pastors, president, committees and ministries were all received, as were a number of financial reports. Pastor Jon noted that although our general budget ended the year with a small deficit, other ministries, such as the hungry jar were up significantly. We are thankful to all who provided support for our work together, and most of all, we are thankful to our gracious and generous God!

In business, the meeting took several actions that will impact the congregation, but also make a difference in the lives of many people nearby and around the world:

- The budget for 2024, including our mission support of over \$38,000 through the synod, campus ministry, and Sugar Creek Bible camp was adopted.
- The Mission Endowment Fund disbursement for 2024 was adopted as proposed. A portion of the disbursement will assist with building repairs, but almost \$13,000 will go to meet human needs in our community and around the world.
- A resolution authorizing the repairs to the building resulting from the storm in late July was approved. Most of the cost will be born by insurance. The meeting decided to

defer action on the rental house and the garage until further examination later in spring.

- Constitution revisions as recommended by the ELCA were adopted. Pastor Jon noted that the revisions consisted of clarification of language and did not change the way we operate.
- Acting on a request from the family, the congregation shifted \$25,000 from the Michelson Scholarship Fund, with \$10,000 going to the Building Fund, and \$15,000 to a new organ fund.

The meeting also elected persons to positions of leadership in the congregation:

- Congregation Council: Tiffany Janisch, Brenda Skittone, Gerald Greeno
- Synod Assembly voting members: Jeff and Melissa Haldeman, Carla Burkhardt, Jaime Fortier
- Mission Endowment Fund: Lee Friell
- Sugar Creek: Jeff Haldeman and Naoko Giblin
- Eagle Crest Communities: Carolyn Karl and Eric Ender

The meeting declined to elect a Nominating Committee, opting instead for a more "discernment based" approach.

Pastor Jon expressed thanks to all who make the life and work of Our Savior's happen, from council and leadership, to music and ministry participants, and everyone else who shares their gifts and talents. Carolyn Karl expressed thanks to the pastors.

The meeting adjourned at 12:08 pm with Pastor Jon leading in closing prayer.

Mission Endowment Fund

We continue our series of articles on Endowments, what they are, what they do, and how they can support the ministry of Our Savior's Mission Endowment Fund in ways that work for you.

ELCA Donor Advised Funds

ELCA Donor Advised Funds are a way in which a donor may retain practical control of how much, when, and to what ministry a gift to the ELCA is distributed. By giving, a person may contract with the ELCA not only to retain supervision of the use of the gift with ELCA ministries, but may also pass that supervision to family members to encourage their faith-based giving. By making the gift of \$25,000 or more, the fund may become an endowment, meaning that principal is retained and only earnings are distributed annually. In effect, this creates a vehicle similar to the foundations utilized by the wealthy. Family members continue to make distribution decisions, and the philanthropy of the donor therefore continues long after their life. But most of all, the family has the satisfaction of making significant gifts each year to worthwhile ministries.

What ministries? Our Savior's ... or Our Savior's Endowment Fund ... or Sugar Creek ... or Campus Ministry ... or the La Crosse Area Synod ... or the World Hunger Appeal...or lots of other ministries that meet the needs of people.

Thrivent Choice Dollars

Remember that if you are a Thrivent member you may have "Thrivent
