What *Really* Happened at Calvary?

When we think of Calvary's cross, the physical suffering of Jesus is often the first picture that comes to mind. Ministers talk about it, Passion Plays reenact it, and devout Christians everywhere ponder it throughout the year. And it does us good to think of that heart-wrenching scene—complete with rough Roman soldiers, jeering mob, and flesh-piercing spikes. When we realize what Christ did for us there—the pain He endured and the way He poured out Himself physically for our unworthy selves—it does something beautiful to our hearts. It softens and changes us and makes us want to pour ourselves out for Him.

But while much attention is and should be given to the physical suffering of Christ, it's important to realize that His physical pain was only a faint reflection of the mental anguish He endured.

SOME TOUGH QUESTIONS

To more fully understand this anguish, we must ask ourselves some very thoughtful questions such as:

 How could a Father give up His only begotten son?

 How could the Son sacrifice Himself?

The Bible says that "God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." (John 3:16). From this great familiar text, we know that God already loved us—long before Calvary's cross. The

real challenge for us humans is to try to comprehend that love—to understand more fully the price God really paid at the Cross.

A TRIP TO MT. MORIAH

With this in mind, let us return to that awful Old Testament scene on Mt. Moriah more than a thousand years before it held the Son of God. If you remember the story, God asked Abraham to do a truly unthinkable thing; to take his son, Isaac, the heir of his possessions and only legitimate son, and kill him—that is, sacrifice him on an altar.

Being the great man of faith that he was, Abraham would have done exactly what God asked him to do. Except for that final moment when God stayed his hand, Abraham would have brought the knife down on his beloved son.

FILLED WITH AGONY

Although we can only imagine it, that long march to Mt. Moriah—when Abraham thought he was going to sacrifice Isaac—had to have been filled with an unspeakable

grief. And there, on Mt. Moriah, we can sense some of the agony that the Father and the Son experienced at Calvary's cross.

Never—nor in the entire universe—were there closer or more tender bonds of affection than those between this Father and Son. Yet sin is such a wretched evil that when Jesus became sin for us, it tore those bonds. And the result was incredibly painful—an indescribable agony to hearts wrung out by sorrow was the prospect of eternal separation between a Father and His Beloved Son. Which is why we hear that awful cry of mental anguish echoing down through the ages from Calvary's cross, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" (Matthew 27:46).

THE ULTIMATE SACRIFICE

That fearful afternoon, when Jesus looked death in

the face, He could not see beyond the tomb. As physical clouds of darkness pressed around the cross, all Christ could see was an eternal darkness—eternal separation from the Father He loved more than life itself. When He uttered those three awful words It is finished, it was to Him a reality. For our sakes, He tasted the death of every sinner who will, at the great judgment day, be eternally separated from God. Yes, Jesus paid that price for you and me. And Jesus—the incomparable Jesus—is the theme of this magazine, especially this issue.

endured. So we ask you to consider the incomparable Jesus. See Him born as a babe in Bethlehem, into a wretched, poverty-stricken world filled with violence, anger and sin. would be like Jesus" we sang at the end of church, though it seemed like many of us were just going through the motions—mouthing the poignant words as we anticipated going home. Then I noticed the teenager sitting next to me. He seemed caught up in the meaning and spirit of the hymn, interspersing the words with sincere petitions: "Jesus, I would be like You," and "Yes, help me to be like You." Worshiping with him was a spiritual blessing I won't easily forget.

As we walked out of the sanctuary, I told him I was indeed blessed by his sincere spirit of worship. "You really want to be like Jesus, don't you?" I commented.

"My life had been crowded with many competing ambitions," he explained, "but ever since I committed my life to Christ, becoming like Him has been my greatest joy and highest ambition." His words rang with an unmistakable conviction.

A DRIVING AMBITION

Should this not be our heartfelt testimony too? And should not Christlikeness be the greatest driving ambition of our lives? That was the magnificent testimony of the apostle Paul, who counted everything as "loss" and "rubbish" when compared to the "surpassing greatness of knowing Christ." (Phil. 3:7, 8, NIV).

Prizing to know his beloved Master, Paul yearned to become more and more like Him. He was Spirit-driven to put self to death so that Christ might form within. Thus he could tri-

umphantly declare, "I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me." (Gal. 2:20, RSV). Christ formed and living within was all that really mattered to him. And should it not be all that matters to us as well?

A FRANTIC SEARCH FOR IDOLS

All around us we see people frantically searching for idols, role models or heroes to imitate. An innate need relentlessly propels us to look up to someone bigger than

ourselves, someone to trust and to emulate. Unfortunately, human beings often overlook Christ as their supreme hero and model, the one to trust, emulate, and worship.

What greater Model can we have in this world! Not only is He the creative genius. He is the God of the universe who embodies in Himself all love, mercy, wisdom, power, glory, trustworthiness and righteousness. "For in Him dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily," (Col. 2:9). In Him reside the answers to all our predicaments, and the fulfillment of the deepest desires of our hearts. "All that can satisfy the needs and longings of the human soul, for this world and for the world to come, is found in Christ. Our Redeemer is the pearl so precious that in comparison all things else may be accounted loss.221

Moreover, not only is He the greatest giver of all good gifts, but beyond that He gives Himself. He is the source of life itself, for He gave Himself for humanity both in the Garden of Eden and at Golgotha. In the garden He made us in His image, fashioned us after His likeness, and breathed into our form His breath of life. (See Gen. 1:26; 2:7.) And at Golgotha He shed His blood of life to restore us into His likeness. (See Eph. 1:7-10.)

The grand and ultimate object of salvation is to restore the image of Christ and His likeness in us. This is the heart and essence of the gospel-what Paul had in mind when he wrote about God revealing the glory and the mystery of all the ages. What was that mystery? "Christ in you, the hope of glory," (Col. 1:27, RSV). It was Paul's passionate desire for the Galatians, with whom he continued to be "in travail until Christ be formed in you." (Gal. 4:19, RSV).

AN ALL-ABSORBING PRIORITY

Christ formed within needs to be our passionate desire too, our all-absorbing priority. The indwell-

ing Christ transforms our inner being and fashions it after His own likeness. We become dead to self, Rom. 6:11.) He lives out His life in and through us, and we continue until in

Him we "become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ." (Eph. 4:13, NIV).

Christ forming within reveals that the kingdom of grace is doing its transforming work in our hearts. This reality also gives us the hope and assurance of inheriting the kingdom of glory, for "when He shall appear, we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is." (1 John 3:2). Becoming Christlike is the golden thread that inextricably weaves together the realms of grace and glory in our lives. By faith we are becoming like Him in this world, so that by sight we may be like Him when we see Him face-to-face in the world to come.

AN AUTHENTIC RELIGION

The Scriptures constantly call for us to have an authentic religion. Indeed, the most offensive thing to God is religious pretense, outwardly professing to be Christians while at the core we are far away from Him. He wishes we were either cold or hot, not lukewarm, which is so repugnant that Christ declares, "I will spew you out of my mouth," (Rev. 3:16, RSV).

To be a genuine Christian is to be Christlike-or allow God to reveal through us what Christ is like. Are we in our innermost beings Christlike or selflike? Do others see more of ourselves and less of Christ? "When we take the name of Christ we pledge ourselves to represent Him. In order for us to be true to our pledge,

> Christ must be formed within, the hope of glory. The daily life must become more and more like the Christ life. ... Christ will have nothing to do with pretense. He will welcome to the heavenly courts only those whose Christianity is genuine. The lives of professed Christians who do not live the life of Christ are a mackery to religion."2

> We must see Christ in this world before we can see Him in the world to come, for we cannot behold Christ in heaven if we do not behold Him here. Christ will see there whom He knows hereit's as simple as that. He turned religious people away from entering His kingdom simply because He didn't know them. (See Matt. 7:23.) "We cannot keep Christ apart from our lives here, and yet be fitted for His companionship in heaven." We need to be familiar with Him and faithful to Him in everyday life in order to see Him face-to-face for all eternity, "To His faithful followers Christ has been a daily companion and familiar friend. They have lived in close contact, in constant communion with God.... They are prepared for the communion of heavens for they have beaven in their bearts. ""

> A truly saved person loves Christ and longs to abide with Him and be like Him. This longing to emulate Christ results from a personal, passionate devotion to Him. And from such ardent devotion

issues all virtues, for in being possessed by Christ we possess all else. It is an awesome privilege that through the grace and power of God we may become like our Creator and Redeemer!

ONENESS WITH CHRIST

Oneness with Christ is the secret of becoming like Him. Satan knows the divine plan to defeat him in this spiritual battle, and he fights it ruthlessly. Our union with Christ is what he dreads most, for he knows that a dynamic union will break his power. His foremost objective is to sever the divine-human relationship and deceive people into believing they can be their own saviors apart from Christ.

But Satan's abominable scheme backfired at Calvary's cross, where it became possible for humanity to be more intimately connected with Christ than ever before. "It was Satan's purpose to bring about an eternal separation between God and man; but in Christ we become more closely united to God than if we had never fallen. In taking our nature, the Saviour has bound Himself to humanity by a tie that is never to be broken.⁵

It overwhelms us to contemplate the thought that Jesus, in His boundless desire to restore us to His likeness, irrevocably altered His own very nature for eternity. For our sake He will forever retain His humanity. And in heaven, the redeemed will gaze into His face and be struck with the realization that, for the sake of their restoration, their divine Creator will forever remain intimately identified with them. An infinite commitment impelled Him to become like us in our humanity so that we may become like Him in His divinity! Boundless love propelled our Creator and Redeemer to partake of our human nature so that we may

partake of His divine nature! (See 2 Peter 1:3, 4.)

"Jesus Christ laid hold on humanity, that with His human arm He might encircle the race, while with His divine arm He grasped the throne of the Infinite." He is fully divine and fully human, experiencing both the glories of heaven and the miseries of earth. "As our Example, we have One who is all and in all, the chiefest among ten thousands, One whose excellency is beyond comparison. He graciously adapted His life for universal imitation." Not only does He sympathize with our weak-

nesses but He also saves us from our sins and empowers us to win the spiritual race. In Christ we may experience victory in reflecting His image, because we are looking unto Him, "the author and finisher of our faith." (Heb. 12:2).

A lost silver coin, marred and covered with grime, is difficult to recognize as valuable because the dirt obscures its image and superscription. Similarly, when a person created in God's image stays away from Him and imitates the world, its grime eventually covers up His image and likeness. To many onlookers it seems that sin has completely effaced God's image, but Christ looks at the person's heart and potential.

The good news is that Christ searches untiringly for the lost. And although it isn't easy to discern His image in a lost soul, His original traces are still there. "God desires to recover that soul and to retrace upon it His own image in righteousness and holiness." No one is ir-

redeemable, and God's presence always brings the promise of restoration. Not only is He able to accomplish it, but He derives profound joy from doing so. For He "delights to take apparently hopeless material, those through whom Satan has worked, and make them the subjects of His grace."

Christ's greatest désire is to clean away the grime in our hearts and retrace in our souls His image and likeness. Heaven has committed all its resources to accomplish this. Has Christ's great love and His enduring commitment to our restoration softened our hard

> hearts and made them pliable and moldable in His creative hands? "As wax takes the impression of the seal, so the soul is to take the impression of the Spirir of God and retain the image of

Christ."33

May the wax, which symbolizes our lives, soften from the warmth of Christ's love. May it be pliable and workable in the creative and redemptive hands of the Master so that He may retrace on it His image and likeness.



he plan for our redemption was not an afterthought, a plan formulated after the fall of Adam. It was a revelation of "the mystery which hath been kept in silence through times eternal." Romans 16:25, R. V. It was an unfolding of the principles that from eternal ages have been the foundation of God's throne. From the beginning, God and Christ knew of the apostasy of Satan, and of the fall of man through the deceptive power of the apostate.

"LO, I COME"

Nearly two thousand years ago, a voice of mysterious import was heard in heaven, from the throne of God. "Lo, I come." "Sacrifice and offering thou wouldest not, but a body hast thou prepared me....Lo, I come (in the volume of the Book it is written of Me;) to do thy will, O God." Heb. 10:5-7.

In these words is announced the fulfillment of the purpose that had been hidden from eternal ages. Christ was about to visit our world, and to become incarnate. He says, "A body hast thou prepared me." Had He appeared with the glory that was His with the Father before the world was, we could not have endured the light of His presence. That we might behold it and not be destroyed, the manifestation of His glory was shrouded. His divinity was veiled with humanity, the invisible glory in the visible human form.

A FRIEND OF SINNERS

Since Jesus came to dwell with us, we

know that God is acquainted with our trials, and sympathizes with our griefs. Every son and daughter of Adam may understand that our Creator is the friend of sin-

ners. For in every doctrine of grace, every promise of joy, every deed of love, every divine attraction presented in the Savior's life on earth, we see "God with us."

Satan represents God's law of love as a law of selfishness. He declares that it is impossible for us to obey its precepts. The fall of our first parents, with all the woe that has resulted, he charges upon the

Creator, leading men to look upon God as the author of sin, and suffering, and death. Jesus was to unveil his deception. As one of us He was to give an example of obedience. For this He took upon Himself our nature, and passed through our experiences, "In all things it behooved him to be made like unto his brethren." Hebrews 2:17.

If we had to bear anything which Jesus did not endure, then upon this point Satan would represent the power of God as insuffficient for us. Therefore Jesus was "in all points tempted like as we are." Hebrews 4:15. He endured every trial to which we are subject. And He exercised in His

own behalf no power that is not freely offered to us. As man, He met temptation, and overcame in the strength given Him from God.

By His humanity, Christ touched humanity; by His divinity, He lays hold upon the throne of God. As the Son of man, He gave us an example of obedience; as the Son of God, He gives us power to obey.

In stooping to take upon Himself humanity, Christ revealed a character the opposite of the character of Satan. But He stepped still lower in the path of humiliation, "Being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross." Phil. 2:8. As the high priest laid aside his gorgeous pontifical robes, and officiated in the white linen dress of the common priest, so Christ took the form of a servant, and offered sacrifice, Himself the priest, Himself the victim. "He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon Him." Isaiah 53:5.

Christ was treated as we deserve, that we might be treated as He deserves. He was condemned for our sins, in which He had no share, that we might be justified by His righteousness, in which we had no share. He suffered the death which was ours, that we might receive the life which was His. "With His stripes we are healed."

Description of the Roman Scourge

"A single scourging consisted of 39 excruciating lashes. The scourge itself was a multi-thouged, short-handled whip made of ox-leather, knotted with small knuckle-bones, or lead balls, or even bronze hooks made to tear the flesh.

He would be stripped naked, jeered at and insulted, hung by his hands from rings in the ceiling, or against a wall, or spread-eagled around a pillar and then, thus exposed and vulnerable, he would be flogged back and front by two or more men chosen for their physical strength, and trained to inflict the most frightful injuries without actual killing.

During this flogging, the victim would first be lashed and wealed, then the flesh would rise in ragged furrows, then the blood would begin to flow, and then he would be practically cut to pieces by the incessant blows on the arms, shoulders, back, kidney areas, buttocks, thighs, legs, the soft flesh of the belly and loins; the skin torn away in jags and strips, the ribs flayed, and even the bowels laid open—blow on blow, until he hung, one wound."

"From insult to renewed insult, from mockery to mockery, twice tortured by the scourge—all that night there had been scene after scene of a character to try the soul of man to the uttermost. Christ had not failed. He had spoken no word but that tended to glorify God. All through the disgraceful farce of a trial He had borne Himself with firmness and dignity. But when after the second scourging the cross was laid upon him, human nature could bear no more. He fell fainting beneath the burden."—The Desire of Ages, p. 742.

WHAT'S REALLY GOING ON?

But most important, don't think about it-just do it! In many subtle ways this thinking has permeated the philosophy of many societies today, both Christian and non-Christian. Unfortunately, this philosophy doesn't produce much real happiness. People have more questions than ever. Why the restlessness, unhappiness, chronic disease, social instability, and downright confusion, even in prosperity? Paul addresses this very issue, with a note of irony, to the "anything goes" Corinthians: "What? know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ve have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price; therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's." 1 Cor. 6:19-20. He adds: "Know ye not that ye are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwelleth in you? If any man defile the temple of God, him shall God destroy; for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are." He closes with the solemn warning: "Let no man deceive himself." 1 Cor. 3:16-18.

COUNTDOWN TO ACCOUNTABILITY

1/2 tsp Magoram


- These croquettes freeze beautifully and are great to pack in a lunch.

The Bible

doesn't tell us how long God and the first couple he created had wonderful fellowship together, but we do know the communion was severed when they chose to distrust their Maker—and the heart of God has been lonely for us ever since. Sin always causes us to separate ourselves from God: because God's presence is a consuming fire to sin, people are no longer able to hold face-to-face communication with Him.

Before the creation of the world, Jesus offered to pay the supreme price for humanity's redemption if they should ever fall. While it was difficult for God to give His only Son for the fallen race, there was no other way to save humankind. Only One equal with the divine law could pay the ransom; therefore, the Heavenly Father consented to the plan. "For God so loved the world, that He gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." (John 3:16).

In the process of time, when the world had become corrupt and the hearts of people were hardened in sin, "the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the Only Begotten of the Father), full of grace and truth. (John 1:14).

The life of Jesus was a perfect reflection of God's character, and as we behold Him, we are led to admire Him—to desire to be like Him. In His death we behold the infinite love of God, and begin to realize how much we mean to Him. Our hearts go out to Him in love and appreciation for what He has done for us.
