## Two Questions Christians Should Ask About Giving

Two common questions Christians ask are: "Where do the offerings go?" and "How much should I give?". If you haven't asked or considered these questions, you really should.

- Tithe is used for the support of pastors, evangelists, Bible teachers, and administrators. The Bible mandates it as 10% of our increase.
- Local Church Budget is used by a church for its local needs such as literature, outreach supplies, church bulletins, utilities, maintenance, insurance, school operating expenses, children's magazines, teaching supplies, worthy student fund, local staff salaries, etc. A personal giving plan suggestion is three to five percent of our increase.
- Conference Advance is used by a local Conference for its needs such as Christian education, local evangelism, Vacation Bible Schools, the monthly Union magazines, summer camps, and much more. A personal giving plan suggestion is one to two percent of our increase.
- World Budget is used by the General Conference for its needs such as medical and educational institutions, world mission support, and evangelism. A personal giving plan suggestion is one to three percent of our increase.
- Special Projects donations is used for Capital campaigns for church or school projects, mission trips, supporting ministries, etc. A personal giving plan suggestion is as God has prospered.

While the tithe we are called to return to God is Biblically set as 10% of our increase, offerings should be given as one is able and should be given from a cheerful heart. When thinking of our stewardship giving/returning (we return tithe, we give an offering) it helps to keep the 3 S's in mind. Our giving should be:

- Sacrificial God sacrificed for our salvation. oh that we would be sacrificial in in our stewardship to Him.
- Systematic –Every day God bestows blessings upon us. It should be a part of our plan and budget to give systematically.
- Spontaneous There are some blessings that God gives us that seem spontaneous. Some are bestowed when unexpected needs arise. Some of our offerings should be spontaneous, as we see needs arise.
